Past Times in Kencot

On 16th February 2018 a gathering was held of people who lived or had lived in Kencot. This included May Gosling (nee Simpson) who was born in Kencot in 1929. These are her memories assisted by others at the meeting

Members of the Simpson family have lived in Kencot village since the 1600s.

May and her younger brother were born in one of the two Church Green cottages – the one next to the church. When she was a toddler, the family moved to The Gardens. At 14, May moved away to work.

May's mother, Dorothy-Simpson, moved in 1960 to one of the council houses on Pinnocks Piece.

The Malthouse was a small independent farm.

The Forshews lived in the Malthouse. They lived in one part of the house. The wing facing the road wasn't lived in at the time but allowed to decay. During WWII soldiers were billeted in the long wing and barns of the Malthouse.

The Forshews had 4 children, Bernice (who died of diphtheria at five years old), Ralph, John and Grace.

Mrs. Forshew was Mary Minnie Oakey before her marriage and was a very forthright woman. Mr Forshew was quiet.

The rest of the Malthouse outbuildings – now the three barn conversions, were used for storage, and a place where the villagers came to buy fresh eggs from the chickens Mr Forshew kept on the land.


At some points in the past, there might have been families living in the barns, 'camping out' as May described it.

Mrs Forshew used to drive for miles around the villages in her pony and trap. (The pony had belonged to the rag and bone man and was given to Anne Oakey's family when he retired but, when it proved to be difficult to ride was passed on to Mary Forshew).

May remembers the children playing in Goodenough barns, and up and down the tallets (outside steps).

Red Rose Close:

Contained 3 to 4 alms houses, Mrs Wilks lived in the top house, just one downstairs and one upstairs room. The other houses were the same. They all shared one well for all their water.

Would you like to learn how to use the village defibrillator, perform CPR and brush up on your emergency first aid training?

If so, you are invited to attend a two hour course of Basic Life Support and CPR training on Thursday 22nd June 2023.

The aim of the evening is to enable attendees to be able to recognise if someone is having a cardiac arrest, provide good quality Basic Life Support, understand how a AED (defibrillator) works and be able to use one competently, and to understand how to

conduct a Primary Survey, Secondary Survey, Recovery Position and access support services.

The training will be provided by local Community First Responders from the South Central Ambulance Service (SCAS) Charity. This is a volunteer organisation which supports the Ambulance Service in providing trained emergency responders who are locally based and able to respond quickly to some categories of 999 calls. Their training and equipment is provided by the SCAS Charity and attendees will be encouraged to make a contribution (suggested minimum of £10 per person please) towards the ongoing work of the SCAS Charity and the British Heart Foundation.
