# **Past Times in Kencot**

# **History of the Village Hall**

The Village Hall, also known as The Carter Institute, was built in 1911. It was built as a reading room for the men of the village as the result of a bequest from Amelia Carter. Reading rooms were also built in Filkins, Clanfield and Bampton

Amelia Carter was born in St Annes, Lower Canada (now Quebec) in 1829. She had two sisters Eleanor born 1826 and Louisa born 1831. Her parents were Amelia and Crisp Richard Beckham Barnaby who married in Kencot church in 1825

Amelia's grandfather was The Reverend James Thorold who was the vicar of Kencot from 1801 to 1857. He was a popular vicar as apparently congregations were at least 50 each Sunday. Rev Thorold sent one of the Kencot bells away to be restored but it never returned. The thought is that he sold it!

In the 1841 Census Amelia her mother and Louisa were living at Kencot Rectory with Rev Thorold. There is no mention of her father or Eleanor. The 1851 census has the same family members but now living at Hill Farm, Kencot.

Eleanor married Rev Arthur Neate at Kencot church in 1844 and they lived at Alvescot having at least two children.

It appears that Louisa did not marry and died in 1898 in Kensington, London. She left Eleanor and Amelia a total £4,024 12s 4d. (Would now be £641,000)

Amelia married John Carter, described on their wedding certificate as a "Gentleman" from Fairford and his father had the same description. We do not have sufficient information about him and there is no further mention of Amelia until her death in Kensington, London in 1905.

I have obtained a copy of Amelia's will which was made on 3<sup>rd</sup> August 1905. It states that the executors were the Rev William HDW Rainey, Vicar of Clanfield & Charles Fletcher Edmunds of South Hinksey. She is described as a widow but there is no further information regarding her husband. Amelia left £9,544.5s.2d. (Now worth £1,529,755)

There are bequests to family and friends.

- A sum of money was to be invested to produce an income of £7 per annum to pay the Vicar and Churchwardens of Bampton for the reading room.
- Plus £4 a year for the Secretary of the Bampton reading room.

- £500 to be invested and the interest to the Vicar and Churchwardens to defray the cost of the Clanfield reading room.
- £200 to be invested and interest to Vicar and Churchwardens of Filkins to defray the cost of the Filkins reading room.
- £100 to Burford Cottage Hospital
- Income from remaining invested to following trusts
- £15 to Vicar and Churchwardens of Clanfield for coals for the poor.
- £7 to Vicar and Churchwardens of Kencott\* for coals for the poor.
- £15 to Vicar and Churchwardens of Filkins for coals for the poor
- Two equal fifths of the residue of income for a comfortable Public Reading Room or library for male inhabitants of Clanfield. Balance of the two fifths for the support to the poor and needy.
- Two equal fifths of the residue of income for a comfortable Public Reading Room or library for male inhabitants of Filkins. Balance of the two fifths for the support to the poor and needy.
- Remaining equal fifth part for a Reading Room or Library in Kencott and to support the poor as above.

In 1824 Amelia's father sold the family home, Broughton Hall hence the connection with Filkins.

As Amelia lived in Kencot and her grandfather was the rector here we assume the reason for the bequest to Kencot.

Amelia requested that her ashes be buried with her son at Kensal Green Cemetery. Having contacted the cemetery, they have a record of her grave but were unable to give further information of her son. No record of her son's birth or death have been found.

We still do not know where Amelia's wealth came from. Many of her family had titles and were officers in the Navy, one being Lord Lieutenant of Oxfordshire and another Ambassador for Barbados.

\*Interesting point Kencott is spelt with 2 "t's" in the will!
