Past Times in Kencot

Village Shops

Gable Ends was the home of the village shop – owned by the Godwins.

One shed was for oil and paraffin and two bigger sheds for food and mending bikes and charging up the radios.

The butcher's shop was at Well House, and Ivy Nook was rumoured to be a drinking house, although no one at the meeting could remember this!

Brookside House

The Police house was in Brookside House, built by the older Mr Taylor. He lived in it for a while, but then his son, Bert lived there. (May recalls that Bert was delivered by Mrs. Acklin, who lived in the top cottage in Bell Lane).(Rosie Close?)

The house was used as a house for the policeman. May remembers Mr Loader who was a lovely man! Gill remembered Mr Burke then Jim Brown. A new police house was built in about 1963 (now Stonesfield House). Jim Brown moved to Witney and was followed by David Hodges. Jim and David covered several neighbouring villages on cycles. In about 1970 Kencot no longer had a policeman and the house was sold.

St George's Church

It wouldn't do not to go to church when May was young. When May went into the church she didn't see the people who were there, but the people from back then – sitting in the pews, wearing their hats and Sunday clothes.

There was a good choir in those days, including Frank Godwin, Fred and Jack Eustace, Mrs Simms, Mr. and Mrs Jones, Mr Sid Keen May, Connie and Joan..

They would go to church three times on a Sunday, including Sunday School in the afternoon.

May thought that Stella's aunty was one of the nicest Sunday School teachers. She would save her sugar ration to make May some coconut ice. It was a happy childhood.

In the 1950's I went to Sunday School which was held at The Manor and I remember Mrs Abraham making popcorn for us on the cooking range (Gill)

Kencot Vicar:

Mr Armstrong was the vicar at this time. He was almost blind. Many people didn't like Rev. Armstrong, but May really liked him and used to spend hours in his study. He would let people look at his bird egg collection.

Leonard remembers that Mr Armstrong taught the boys to make fireworks with saltpetre that exploded. May's mum and she lived in the vicar's house to look after him for a while , and he used to bang about the house like a madman. May thinks he was too clever and that was why he behaved the way he did!

He taught May to play the violin. People thought he was 'as mad as a hatter' He once took a group of scouts for a picnic in the barn and set fire to the floor!

May says that the children who came after them - including the evacuees -were unkind to him, bullied him, and once wrapped him up in a carpet.
